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Preface

The Township of Haverford Police Department for the past twenty years has been undergoing a philosophic transformation. This transformation continued throughout 2010. In an effort to better serve our community the department has moved from a reactive police force to a proactive department that works in partnership with the community. The goal of this partnership is to deliver the highest level of police service possible to Haverford Township, its residents, businesses and the citizens of our larger community. This annual report is a reflection of our efforts.

A review of the 2010 Crime statistics for the Police Department revealed a 1% decrease in crimes reported and seven thousand four hundred and eighty-eight traffic violations issued. These statistics are a reflection of Chief Pettine's and the Police Departments commitment to reduce crime in our community. Through the use of the 'Operation Safe Streets' campaign, which focuses on quality of life and traffic issues, and "Operation Keep Safe", which focuses on a reduction of nuisance crimes, officers have been able to address those crimes which directly impact our residents.

Chief Pettine continues to push for the department to move forward into the 21st century, by enhancing the department's ability to utilize effective crime reduction strategies. This goal will be achieved by providing officers with the best available equipment, training and programs that enable them to provide a level of service and protection that the residents of Haverford Township have come to rely on.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Haverford Township Police Department is to improve the quality of life throughout the Township by providing a secure community environment through the delivery of police services in an efficient and effective manner.

We, the Haverford Township Police Department, are dedicated to protecting all persons, and fostering a positive relationship of cooperation and understanding between the Police Department and the citizens of Haverford Township.

We shall strive to establish a climate of mutual respect and trust through positive interaction with citizens of the community and by maintaining a community oriented policing philosophy.

Acknowledgement

Without the support and commitment by the men and women of this department the services and philosophies outlined in this annual report would not be possible. We gratefully thank them for their support.

We would also like to acknowledge Commissioner Stephen D'Emilio, for his continued support of the Officers and programs instituted by the police department. Commissioner D'Emilio was the Commissioner appointed to the Police Committee for 2010. He was involved in ensuring that the police department was provided the opportunity to deliver quality service to the members of this community

This is the third edition of the Haverford Township Police Department Annual Report. This report was created under the direction of Chief Carmen D. Pettine and compiled by the officers of the Police Department's Community Policing Unit.

Departmental Organization and Staffing

The Department has three divisions and a total complement of one hundred and forty-eight sworn and civilian personnel.

The Township of Haverford Board of Commissioners established a Night Watch and Police Force June 5, 1916. When Ordinance number 77 of 1916 passed it did “ordain” the Night Watch and Police Force would consist of one Chief of Police and not more than nine Policemen, one of whom may be appointed Sergeant of Police.

Our Departmental history shows the first Chief, Edward F. Hallisey, and the five officers initially hired did not have long lived or prosperous careers. The Chief left the Department after only three years and ten months of service. His first recruits fared far worse. The first officer hired by the Township, George T. Neeli lasted ten days and the second officer hired completed four months. This four month stint was three months longer than any of his fellow hires. Ordinance number 77 also outlined the officers’ duties. “Policemen shall patrol their respective beats during all of the time they are on duty and shall be governed in making arrests of all drunken, disorderly and suspicious persons by the laws of this Commonwealth, and by the Ordinances and Regulations of the Township. It shall also be the duty of Policemen to inspect the street lights maintained by the Township and to immediately report any lights not in good order and further to inspect all poles, lines and overhead wires and all streets and roads containing water, gas or other pipe-lines and to immediately report any defects therein or dangerous condition caused thereby...”



Today our Department consists of one Chief of Police, sixty nine sworn officers and seventy-nine civilian personnel. The civilian personnel consist of five information assistants, one administrative assistant, one records office manager, two secretaries, two full time records clerks, two part time records clerks, five part time parking enforcement officers and sixty-one crossing guards. Of the sixty nine officers one is a Deputy Chief, three are Lieutenants, twelve are Sergeants and fifty-three are Police Officers. Over the last twenty-seven years this Department has hired 93 officers. All of those hires have either retired or remain actively employed by the department with the exception of eighteen officers. Those officers served an average of 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ years with the three longest serving officers completing 16 years of service. Seven of the officers left the department to work for other Law Enforcement agencies.

In 2010 three officers retired from the department. Officer Richard Peezick served his last day of duty on January 7th 2010 after completing twenty-five years of dedicated



service. Officer Peezick was provided a “Last Ride” police escort from his home to the police station on his final day. This is a tradition implemented by Chief Pettine. The “Last Ride” is a tribute to the retiring officer and a means of letting the community know one of “It’s Finest” is on his way to work for the final time. The Department has a small retirement ceremony at the station where the Officers are presented with a plaque and their retirement badge. The department’s

manpower was further reduced by the resignation of three officers who left to pursue other opportunities

In the last one hundred years not only has officer retention drastically improved but the education and certification the officers possess is unprecedented in our department history. In 2010 our sixty nine officers completed seven thousand five hundred and ninety-one hours of police education.

The department has had twelve Chiefs and three hundred and forty seven officers. Carmen D. Pettine is the twelfth Chief of Police for Haverford Township. Chief Pettine has a strong belief in community based policing and continues to move our department forward from the Night Watch mentality of the first eighty years of our history to an even more proactive, partnership based community policing model we operate under today.

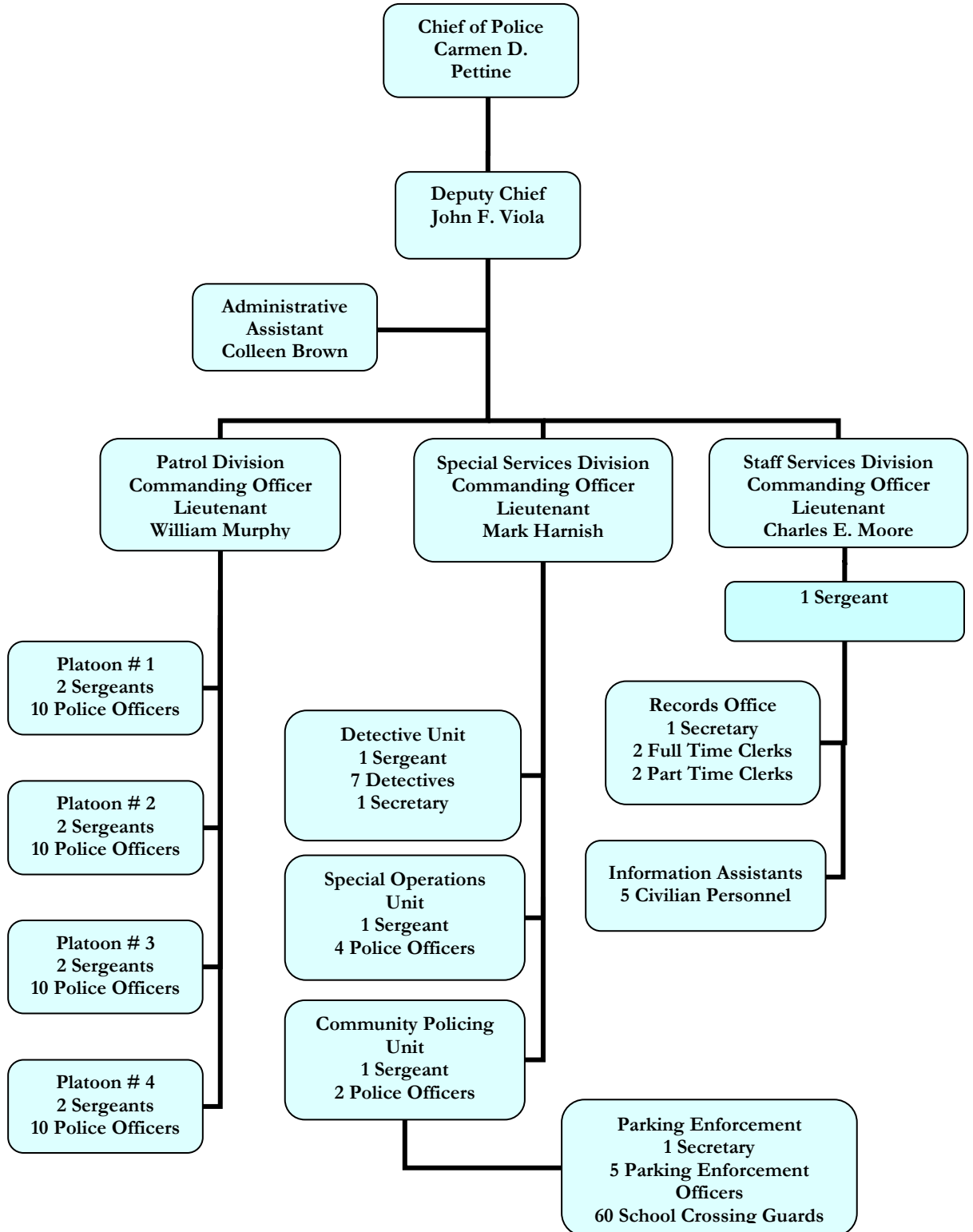

Haverford Township Police Organizational Chart

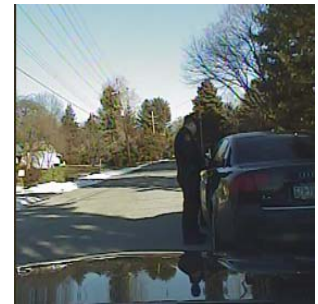


Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is the backbone of the Haverford Township Police Department. It is tasked with carrying out the basic functions of the police department. While every member of the department is sworn to protect life and property, prevent crime, and arrest violators of the law, it is the members of the patrol division that help to accomplish these goals through routine patrol of geographical areas, responding to emergency and non emergency calls for service, investigating traffic collisions, enforcing the motor vehicle laws, and handling other requests for police services. The patrol division is on duty twenty four hours a day, seven days a week and is staffed by two Lieutenants, eight Sergeants, and forty police officers.

A manpower distribution plan is used by the Department. The plan utilizes multiple districts along with overlapping sectors. This plan allows the officer assigned to a district to maximize their time in the assigned district. This is accomplished by assigning the sector officer to the back-up role rather than bringing another district officer out of his district to back a fellow district officer.

The plan allows the Department to keep the officers who patrol a district familiar with the people and issues occurring in that district. An Officer is generally assigned to the same district or sector for an extended period of time so they become familiar with the activity in the area. The approach fosters a better working relationship between the community and the officers that can lead to an ownership mentality around the unique issues in their area.



In an effort to reduce DUI related crashes and fatalities and continue it's commitment with The Northern Delaware County Driving under the Influence Task Force; the Department trained all of the police officers assigned to patrol in Standardized Field Sobriety Testing. Each officer received 24 hours of intensive classroom and practical instruction in the detection of impaired drivers. The training of these officers allows the Police Department to utilized patrol officers in

D.U.I. check points and also provides them with information that can be utilized during their normal patrol duties.

The police department Honor Guard was invited to participate in the opening ceremonies of a Phillies game at Citizen's Bank Park in May 2010. The Honor Guard presented the State and National colors on the field during the singing of the national anthem. The Haverford Police Department Sub-Station was opened in the former location of the Citizen's Bank ATM office in the Manoa Shopping center. The sub-station is being utilized as an office area for Street Patrol Officers to use during routine patrol of the shopping center. The Community Policing Unit was on location several days throughout the year conducting walking patrols and selling bicycle helmets. The availability of this space allows for officers to have an opportunity to have contact with residents who are conducting business in the shopping center and also provided an opportunity for the business owners to address any concerns or safety issues to officers. Residents are reminded that the sub-station is not always manned and to call 911 to request assistance or report any crimes in progress. There is a direct 911 line to the Delaware County Communications Dispatch center located on the wall next to the main doors. The Community Policing Unit plans to have several scheduled events at the sub-station in 2011. These events will be advertised on the Township website.



Special Services Division

The Special Services Division is commanded by one Lieutenant who is responsible for four separate elements; the Detective Unit, the Special Operations Unit, the Community Policing Unit and the Parking Enforcement Office. The Special Services Division Lieutenant is also the Critical Incident Team Commander.

Detective Unit

The Detective Division is currently comprised of Detective Sergeant Daniel Wallower, Detective Mark Johnson, Detective Matthew Hufnal, Detective Jere Goodman, Detective Eugene Dolan, Detective Thomas Long and Detective Stephen Laughlin. The Detective Division is under the command of Lieutenant Mark Harnish who will be retiring in late January 2011 after 38 years of proud service. Lieutenant Charles Moore will assume command of the Detective Division. The Detective Division conducts follow up investigations on all major crimes occurring in Haverford Township as well as investigations into other suspicious incidents or criminal activities.

This year the Detective Division was instrumental in the arrest of the serial bank robber Hiram Adams also known as the **Mummy Bandit** on August 4th 2010. Adams has pleaded guilty in Federal Court to numerous bank robberies throughout the region and is serving a lengthy prison term. As a result of Adams' arrest Detective Long, Detective Goodman, Detective Hufnal, Detective Dolan, Officer M. Flynn of the Community Policing Unit and Officer K. Gilman of the Patrol Division received awards from the FBI.

The Detective Division also arrested Joseph Pollard and Ronnie Tolbert of Philadelphia, a pair of serial Pharmacy Robbers who struck in Philadelphia, Montgomery and Delaware Counties. The pair was taken into custody after a collaborative investigation between the Philadelphia, Lower Merion, Marple, and Haverford Township Police Departments. The duo was subsequently charged under Federal Statutes and is awaiting trial.

During the year 2010 the Detective Division served 20 Search and Seizure Warrants for Theft, Stalking and Drug related crimes resulting in 20 arrests and the recovery of property, drugs, and firearms. While serving one such warrant for drugs a Gambling/Bookmaking operation was uncovered. Seized were marijuana, and drug related items, a computer used for the gambling operation, a firearm and \$64,000.00 cash. The home owner Gerald Kelleher was subsequently arrested and charged with Pool Selling and Bookmaking and Drug related charges. He subsequently pleaded guilty in Common Pleas Court.

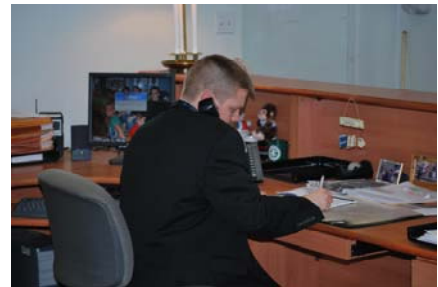
On July 6th and August 8th 2010 the Haverford Township Police responded to two home invasions in the township. The investigations of these incidents revealed that intruders were targeting business owners of Asian decent and following them from their place(s) of business to their respective homes. Through a collaborative extensive investigation involving the FBI, Philadelphia Police, Haverford Township Police and numerous other tri-county agencies Tyree Mansell, Terrance Downing and Nyfis Toppings were arrested and charged under Federal Statues and are awaiting trial. The investigation is ongoing.

On September 29th, 2010 the Detective Division assisted the Special Operation Unit in a fatal crash investigation, in which the operator left the scene of the crash while driving a stolen vehicle. As a result of this team work Donnie Sayers of Bryn Mawr was arrested and confessed to this crime and is awaiting trial.

The Detective Division investigated an Arson Fire at the Eagle Towers apartment building on October 29th 2010 at 10:59 PM. The Eagle Towers is a five story, sixty-two apartment, building located in the 2300 block of East Darby Rd. The fire was located on the fourth floor. All tenants were safely evacuated by Police and Fire personnel. A thorough investigation led to the arrest of Andrew O'Brien of Havertown. He is currently incarcerated at the Delaware County Prison awaiting trial.

Juvenile Criminal Investigations are also conducted by the Juvenile Detective. During the year 2010, 49 juveniles were petitioned to Juvenile Court with charges including assault, theft, sexual assault and drug violations.

An additional responsibility of the Juvenile Detective is overseeing the referral of juveniles to the Youth Aid Panel program. This program is designed to divert first time juvenile offenders away from the formal juvenile court system. The program is applicable to any first time offender who has committed a relatively minor offense such as a curfew violation, retail theft, underage drinking, disorderly conduct etc. During the year 2010 136 juveniles underwent background checks for the Youth Aid Panel, 25 juveniles



were determined to be ineligible due to prior offenses. Of the 111 juveniles offered the Youth Aid Panel; 83 have completed the program, 27 juveniles are in the process of completing the program and 1 juvenile was disqualified due to a second offense while enrolled in the Youth Aid Program.

The Detective Division also fingerprinted 153 citizens who require this service as part of their pre-employment requirements for employment with Federal Agencies, child care, teachers, securities exchange, etc. There were 118 background checks conducted for other agencies such as the Armed Forces, Federal government, State or local Government. In 2010 there were 184 Firearm permit background checks conducted at the request of the Delaware County Sheriff's Department.

Special Operations Unit

Due to the changing nature of the world in general and police work in particular, providing quality law enforcement services goes beyond the "beat cop". The Special Operations Unit (SOU) is responsible for many facets in the overall operation of the Police Department. The Unit is staffed by 1 Sergeant and 4 Police Officers and allows the Department flexibility in deploying officers of the unit for special events, conducting training or other administrative functions without depleting the resources of the regular patrol unit.

One of the primary responsibilities of the SOU is fatal (and near fatal) crash investigations, crashes involving police cars, hit-and-run crashes or any other extraordinary crash. Specialized equipment used in those investigations includes Laser Technology's LTI 200 laser measuring device and CAD Zone's Crash Zone diagramming software. All members of the Unit have completed the basic fatal crash investigation classes, and at least one advanced crash investigation class. In 2010 the SOU investigated 3 fatal accidents and 4 serious accidents that involved special circumstances.



In an attempt to prevent crashes, members of the Unit utilize the three E's - Engineering, Education and Enforcement. The engineering facet consists of conducting traffic surveys and making recommendations concerning traffic patterns and restrictions, i.e., traffic calming. The education facet finds Unit members attending community meetings and listening to their concerns, offering a variety of solutions and working with the Township to complete the task. The

enforcement facet is the extremely focused solution to crash prevention. By issuing a citation, the goal of the police officer is to prevent the reoccurrence of a potentially dangerous behavior. The Department participated in two specialized programs, Buckle-Up PA & Smooth Operator, that received both federal and state funding. The primary focus of Buckle-Up is seatbelt usage, and encompasses both education and enforcement portions of the program. Smooth Operator is targeted toward aggressive driving behaviors, and is strictly an enforcement program. During these programs, contact was made with drivers, and officers issued 931 citations.

The Operation Safe Streets Program continued through 2010. The aim is to improve the livability of neighborhood streets by “calming” or regulating the impact of vehicular traffic. When streets are safe and pleasant, the quality of life is enhanced. When traffic problems become a daily occurrence, they threaten one’s senses of community and personal well being. Operation Safe Streets is about livability in one’s neighborhood. The program allows the citizens of Haverford



Township to address quality of life issues such as stop sign violations, speeding, cut-through traffic, illegal parking and abandoned vehicles. The SOU processed over 164 abandoned vehicles which had been left on street throughout the community. Thirteen of those vehicles had to be removed by police; the remaining vehicles were removed by the registered owners. Abandoned vehicles

not only are an eyesore for residents, they create a hazardous condition. The diligence of the officers handling these abandoned vehicles improved the quality of life issues in our community.

The Department continued to coordinate The Northern Delaware County Driving under the Influence Task Force. The Department is responsible for coordinating six area departments in conducting DUI Check Points and the training of officers concerning DUI related issues. The SOU facilitated 14 task force events.

Officers assigned to the SOU also conduct firearms training for the Police Department, as well as other training required by the State and Department. They conducted over 1,120 officer-hours of firearms training and qualification. Intra-departmental training found officers in a classroom for over 1,000 hours consisting primarily of First Aid/CPR with an additional 864 hours conducting SFST training. The SOU provided 400 hours of physical fitness training. Our Officers attended over 6,555 hours of instruction both in house and outside of the Department in various disciplines related to their responsibilities.

Additional duties of the SOU include: Maintaining certifications; repairing or facilitating the repair of equipment, from VASCAR units to flashlights; disposition of seized registrations and driver's licenses; investigation and disposition of abandoned vehicles; conduct traffic studies for volume and speed; specialized traffic enforcement e.g., commercial motor vehicles; car seat checks and installation as well as acting as Quartermaster.

Community Policing Unit

The mission of the Haverford Township Police Department Community Policing Unit is to provide information to the public so it can be informed of current crime trends and have a basic understanding of how to reduce their risk of victimization.

The Community Policing Unit is comprised of one (1) Sergeant and two (2) Police Officers. The members of the unit are all Certified Crime Prevention Specialists. Members of this unit provide support to the Patrol Division and Detective Unit, as well as the community. It works closely with the residential, commercial and industrial communities and develops strategies that promote proactive community problem solving and crime prevention.

The foundation of a successful community policing strategy is the close, interactive relationship between officers and community members working toward the goal of reducing crime and its effects. Efforts focus on the underlying causes of crime by assessing the characteristics of problems in specific neighborhoods and the application of appropriate, mutually supported problem-solving remedies in a partnership role.

Crime prevention officers work closely with all community groups such as Local Civic Associations, Optimist Clubs, Rotary Club, Church groups, Boys and Girl Scout troops and Neighborhood organizations with Community based safety presentations and programs. Additionally the unit is responsible for presenting a wide range of safety and education programs to students in the Haverford Township School District and Parochial Schools.



The most notable accomplishment for the Community Policing Unit was the successful application for a highly competitive BASLE (Better Automation and Sharing for Law Enforcement grant funded by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency. A two year grant for \$390,940.00 was approved.

The Haverford Township Police Department agreed to spearhead the application of this grant which will provide funding for the expansion of the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Information Sharing (CJPSIS) program to include all forty-one police agencies in Delaware County. This expansion will enable all of the Police Departments in Delaware County to share real-time information from various records management systems utilized by the individual departments. This real time availability of this information will enhance the safety for Officers on the street.

The funding will be utilized to implement the installation and upgrade of the records management systems for all police departments to Visual Alert 2, this synchronization of systems, will allow for information to be shared by departments. The funding will also be utilized to implement an Automated Criminal Complaint Electronic Submission Service (Ac2es2) to all departments. This automated system will streamline the booking process by allowing officers to input information into the records management system which will then forward the information to the various processes involved in booking and arraigning subject that are arrested thereby reducing the amount of time and paperwork involved in the booking process. The application for this grant was a joint effort between the Delaware County District Attorney's Office, the Delaware County Police of Chief's Association and the Haverford Township Police Department.

In 2010 the Community Policing Unit worked in conjunction with the Haverford High School videography class to create a public service announcement addressing parking concerns throughout the township. This PSA was entitled "Hey Officer can I ask you a question"? The short commercial was filmed by high school students, and depicted a resident receiving a parking ticket and asking a uniformed officer about the reasons for all of the parking laws being enforced. This commercial was the first in a series of public services announcements in production, which will be played on the township community channel to address questions and concerns presented to the Police Department by community members.



The Officers of the CPU continued the effort to reduce underage drinking and dangerous behavior by conducting park checks and saturation patrol of problem areas throughout the township. The CPU Officers conducted eleven (11) Law Enforcement Details over the grant period. These details targeted known areas for underage and problematic drinking. The department also conducted eighty-nine (89) elementary school classes through our R.E.A.C.H. program that targets the concerns of alcohol abuse, underage and problematic drinking. This department contacted in excess of 630 elementary school students through the R.E.A.C.H. program. These contacts included 20 one hour classes with a minimum of 25

students per class in the public elementary schools. This accounted for 500 of the total students. The other 130 students were private elementary school students. The department had contact with those 130 students for twelve one hour class. Totalling 2,060 student contacts. The Department created and distributed 2000 underage and problematic drinking pamphlets in conjunction with this grant throughout the community.

The department utilized geographical mapping and a review of departmental records to determine problematic areas and behaviors. The initial review of statistical data revealed the major concern to be underage drinking which resulted in 68 underage drinking arrests, with a secondary issue being identified as problematic behaviors associated with alcohol use which resulted in 71 public drunkenness arrests. This concern was supported by the number of arrests (15) and contacts (113) with juveniles after dark in public parks, playgrounds and wooded areas within the community. As a result of the increased efforts of the department to combat underage and dangerous drinking in public areas we have noticed a decrease in the behavior in those areas. This effort was funded by a grant received from the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board.

Police Motorcycles

An additional responsibility of the CPU is the coordination of the police department motorcycle officers and events. The motorcycles are utilized in many various aspects of police work however they are primarily used for traffic enforcement and routine patrol. The department also provides police motorcycle escorts and traffic control for visiting dignitaries, large funerals, parades and special events.



During 2010 Haverford Police Department Motorcycle Officers participated with approximately 100 motorcycles from various agencies and the Philadelphia Police Department Motorcycle Drill Team at their annual Thrill Show held at the Wells Fargo Center. We also assisted with the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner deliveries to families of fallen officers throughout the Philadelphia, Montgomery, Delaware and Bucks county area. Haverford Township Police Department Motorcycles assisted with several funerals of Police Officers killed in the line of duty.

In April of 2010, the department increased the number of Motor Officers by one. Officer Eric Hatton attended and successfully completed the Basic Police Motorcycle Operators course. This course is an intensive 2-week basic motorcycle police officers training course, focusing on ten practical exercises that stress low-

speed maneuverability, evasion techniques, and high-speed braking skills, students spend approximately 90% of the course "in the saddle." They are given practical exercises and riding instruction supplemented with classroom instruction and demonstrations of tactical techniques.

This intensive 80-hour program develops the coordination, skills and confidence necessary for officers to operate a police motorcycle safely and efficiently. Some of the topics covered include: Addressing the needs of individual officers and their Departments, machine nomenclature, slow speed maneuvering, control braking, curve negotiation, motorcycle maintenance, defensive driving techniques and law enforcement techniques. The training provides the police officers with the



confidence and skills required to ensure their safety and to utilize the motorcycle to enhance public safety. Officers who successfully complete the course receive a certificate of completion along with Motor Wings to be worn on their uniform. Haverford Township is fortunate to have two Motor Officers certified as instructors. Sergeant Michael Glenn and Officer John

Esher are certified through Northwestern University and Harley-Davidson as Basic Police Motorcycle Operator Instructors, they conducted approximately 124 hours of training to officers from our department along with officers from neighboring communities.

The department purchased a Kawasaki 250 Dirt/Street motorcycle and a Suzuki 500 ATV. These two off road vehicle are being utilized to allow officers access to areas along the former railroad bed. The former railroad bed runs from the rear of the LA Fitness center up to the site of the former bubble gum factory. The vehicles are also used to access the trails and wooded areas of the Haverford Reserve as well as the trails along the Darby Creek. These areas were only accessible by foot and officers were not able to patrol the areas in a timely manner.

School Crossing Guards

The coordination and supervision of the school crossing guards is under the direction of the Sergeant of the Community Policing Unit. There are currently sixty men and women employed as crossing guards, these guards are responsible for all of the school crossings within the Township. There were fourteen guards who resigned between January 2010 and December 2010. The vacancies were filled by utilizing substitutes and hiring ten replacements. The department always welcomes residents to submit applicants for this position. This can be done by contacting the secretary of the Community Policing Unit at 610-853-1298 ext. 261

Training for the crossing guards was conducted by the Community Policing Unit officers in conjunction with Keystone AAA. This training is conducted on the first day of school, and serves as a refresher for the guards as to their responsibilities in crossing the school aged children and pedestrians. An end-of-year meeting and appreciation luncheon was held in June 2010 to re-cap the performance of the guards during the school year.



Parking Enforcement

The Parking Enforcement Office is under the direction of the Sergeant of the Community Policing Unit and is responsible for all of the parking meter enforcement. The office is staffed by one secretary and five part time parking enforcement officers.

Throughout the township are 416 parking meters, these meters are located within five



different municipal parking lots and curbside parking spaces at several different business districts. New central meters were installed in Brookline and Oakmont municipal parking lots. These new meters are solar powered and will assist the Township in “going green” by reducing the electric costs to run the meters. The meters are maintained and serviced by Parking Enforcement

Officers, who are also responsible for the coin collection from these meters.

During 2010 The Police Department added parking enforcement to its “Safe Streets” campaign in an effort to improve public safety and enhance the quality of life within the community. The increased enforcement initiative was part of an effort to encourage voluntary compliance with parking regulations and address citizen’s complaints of parking violations throughout the township. The Police Department achieved these parking compliance goals in a multiphase approach. The first step was to focus on resident and motorist education promoting voluntary compliance, secondarily focusing the efforts of our patrol officers on the parking campaign and the third stage was by increasing the fines of tickets issued for violations. The parking meter rate was increased from \$.25 per hour to \$.25 per half hour. The fees haven’t been raised in over five years; the Police Department conducted a survey of other municipalities with parking meters and found Haverford Township fees to be below the average. The added revenue will help

offset the rising costs associated with maintenance, repair and replacement of meters. The final step was to rename the Meter Enforcement officers to Parking Enforcement officers to reflect their expanding responsibilities that will now include the enforcement of violations upon residential streets and roadways along with meter time violations and Fire Marshall Zone parking violations.

There were a total of 4,522 parking tickets issued in 2010. Parking Enforcement Officers issued 3,584 of those parking tickets. Collections from meters totaled \$133,256.42. This amount was an increase from the 2009 amount of \$96,566.90. The police department municipal parking lot sticker sales totaled \$9,525.00 which is an increase from the 2009 amount of \$8,241.00. Fines collected for parking violations totaled \$61,910.00 in 2010, which was an increase from \$44,415.00 in 2009. There were 1002 parking violation citations issued for un-paid parking tickets.



Critical Incident Team (CIT)

The Critical Incident Team is a specialized group of highly trained officers that are utilized by this department to respond to the most dangerous and critical incidents in the township and surrounding jurisdictions when requested. These officers are divided among two teams; the Special Response Team and the Crisis Negotiations Team.

Special Response Team

The Special Response Team is the department's tactical team. The officers that comprise the Special Response Team are all highly trained and motivated officers who are tasked with resolving critical incidents through the use of specialized weapons and tactics.

The police department is able to utilize four current officers as certified instructors in various police sciences pertaining to tactical operations. Sergeant Joseph Hagan along with Patrol Officers John Esher and Stephen Birney are certified NRA firearms instructors. Officer Michael Flynn is an internationally recognized instructor in Tactical Team Development receiving his certification from Heckler & Koch International Training Division. These certifications allow the department to develop and provide high quality in-house training to enhance and expand the Special Response Teams capabilities. These trainings are coordinated through the Special Operations Sergeant, Sergeant Joseph Hagan.



This year the Special Response Team as a group and individually received over 1160 hours of specialized training. The training consisted of practice in basic tactical movement, firearms, less than lethal weapons, and specialized tools including hazmat suits, distraction devices and deployment of chemical agents. The team was activated four times throughout the year, for various incidents. The team was successful in completing each mission.

Crisis Negotiation Team

The police department also maintains a Crisis Negotiation Team. The Crisis Negotiation Team is responsible for resolving critical incidents through the use of specialized negotiation tactics. The team is coordinated by Sergeant Shant Bedrossian.

All the members of the Crisis Negotiation Team have received training from the Federal Bureau of Investigations along with the Law Enforcement Officers Training School in basic crisis negotiations. Several of the team members have also received training in Advanced Negotiations and Specialized Negotiations from the Federal Bureau of Investigations and the Law Enforcement Officers Training School.

The Crisis Negotiations Team regularly attends the Federal Bureau of Investigations conference on negotiations held in Baltimore Maryland. This conference covers the newest techniques and trends in resolving critical incidents.

The team also conducts regular in-house and scenario based training, to enhance readiness of the team.

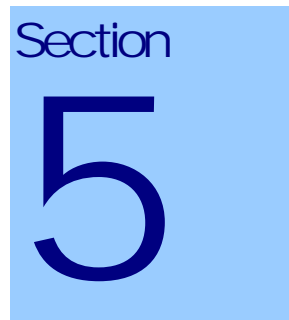
Staff Services Division

The Staff Services Division is the information center within the police department. The division is commanded by one Lieutenant and comprised of two units, the Records Unit and the Information Assistant Office. The division has one Sergeant assigned who leads eleven civilian personnel.

The Records Unit

The Records Unit is a component of the Staff Services Division. It is staffed by both police and civilian personnel who are committed to providing professional service to the public. It maintains all reports generated by the officers; which includes arrest reports, incident reports, crash reports, citations (traffic and non-traffic) and parking tickets. It also coordinates with the courts in scheduling hearings for the officers.

In 2010 the Records Unit provided information from over 19,000 police events to persons requesting information. The unit processed over 4,522 parking tickets and was responsible for the billing of over one hundred eight chargeable alarms that required a police response. These alarms totaled \$32,550.00 worth of fines.

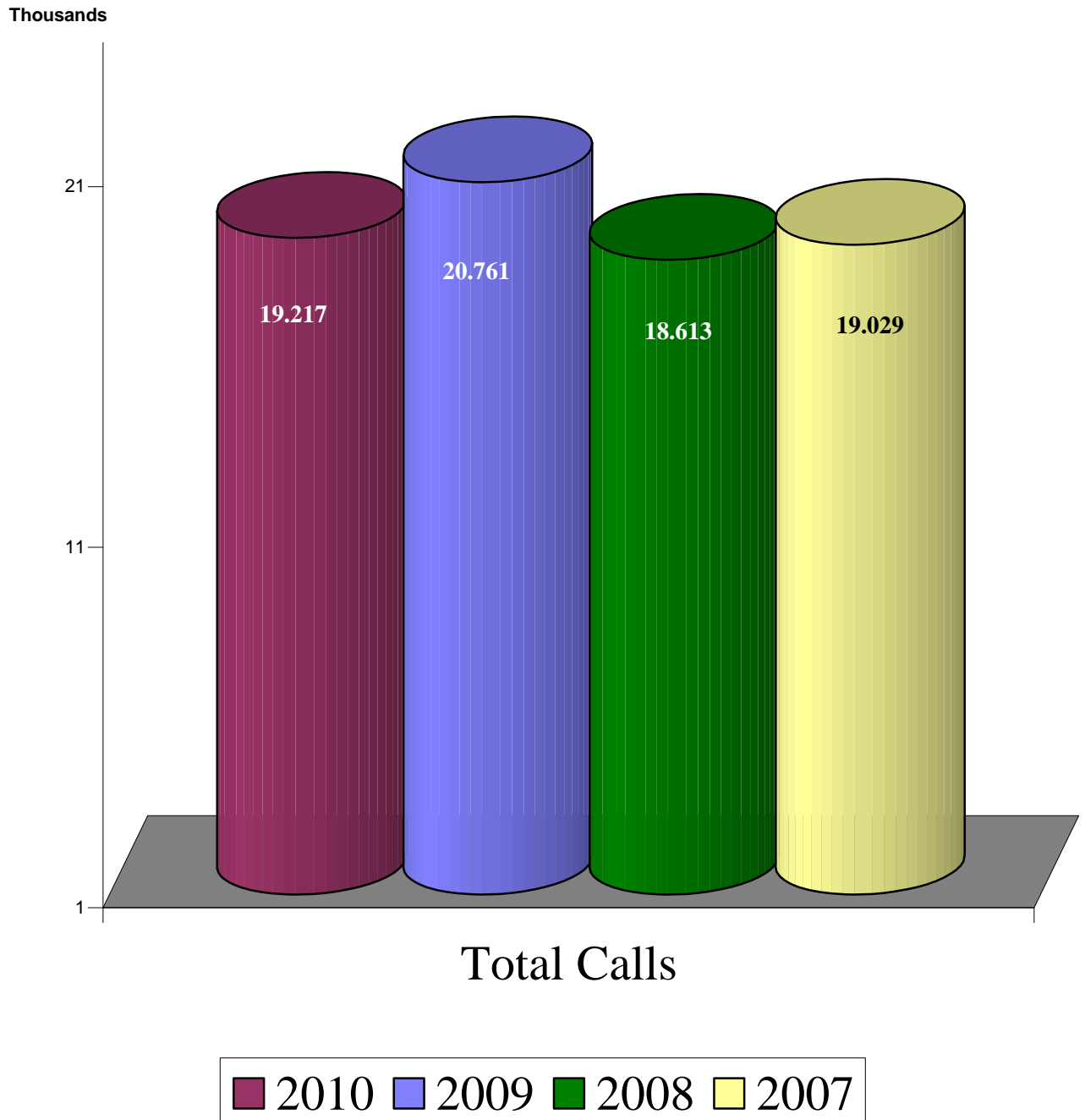

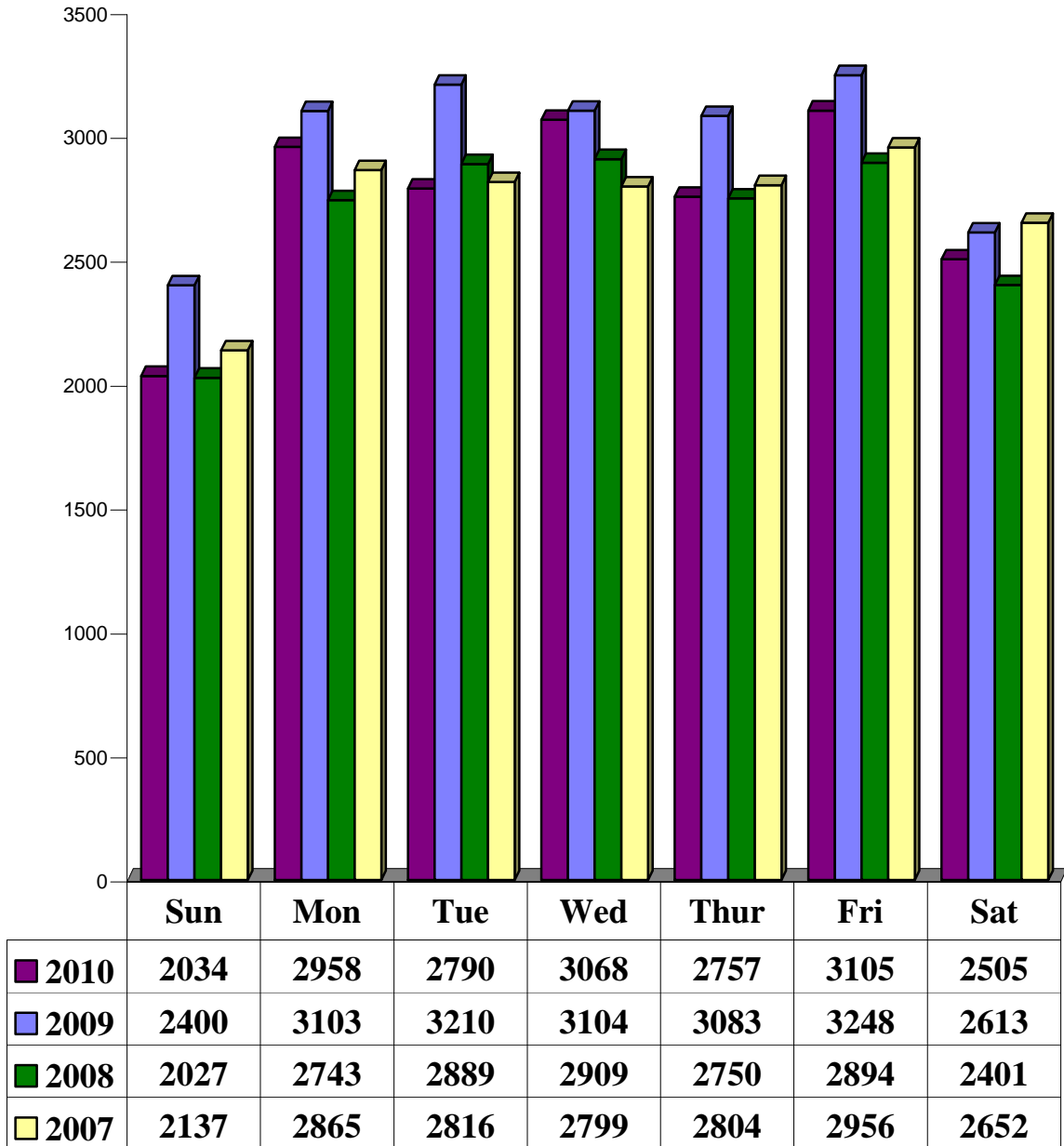
Four Year Comparison

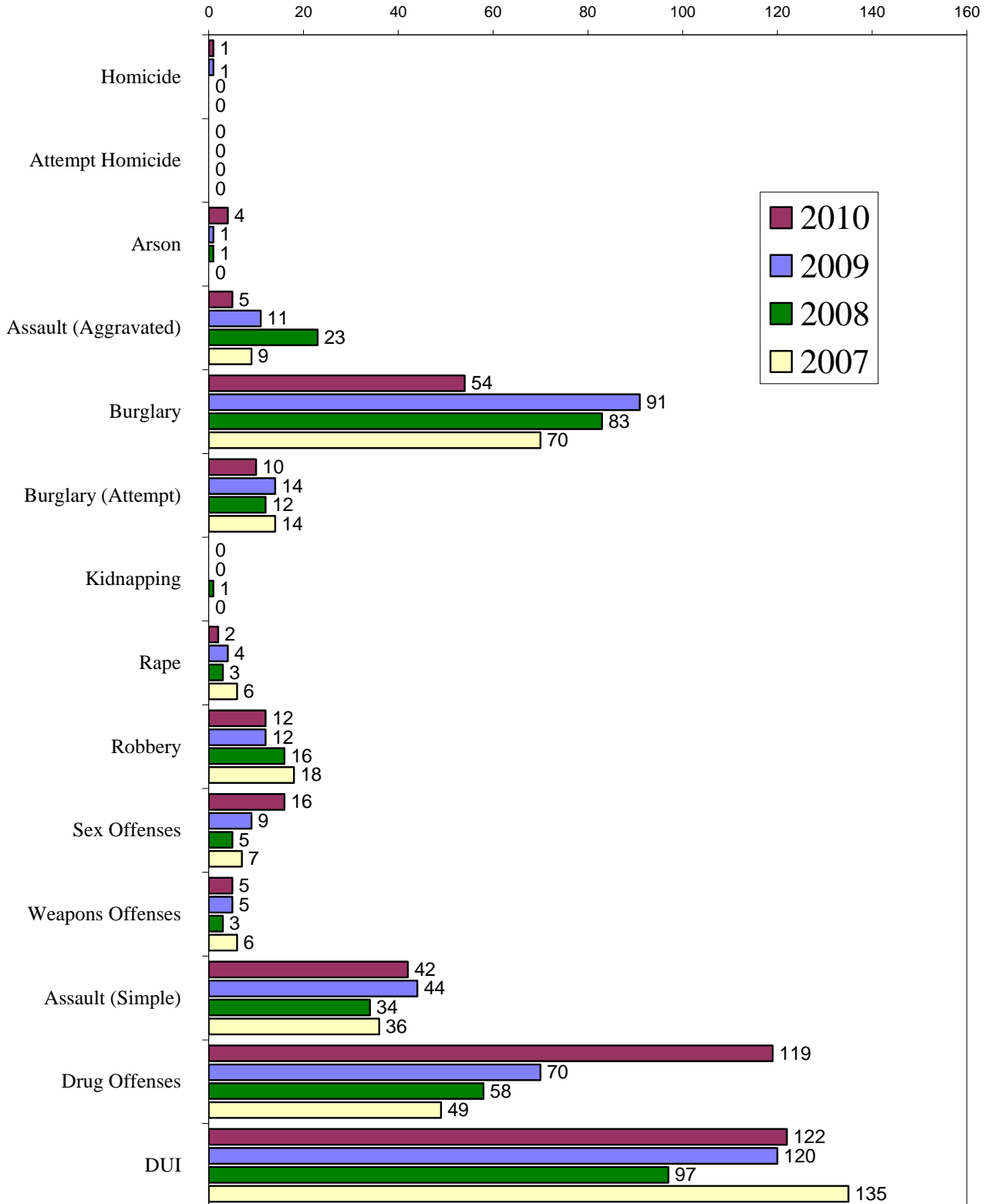

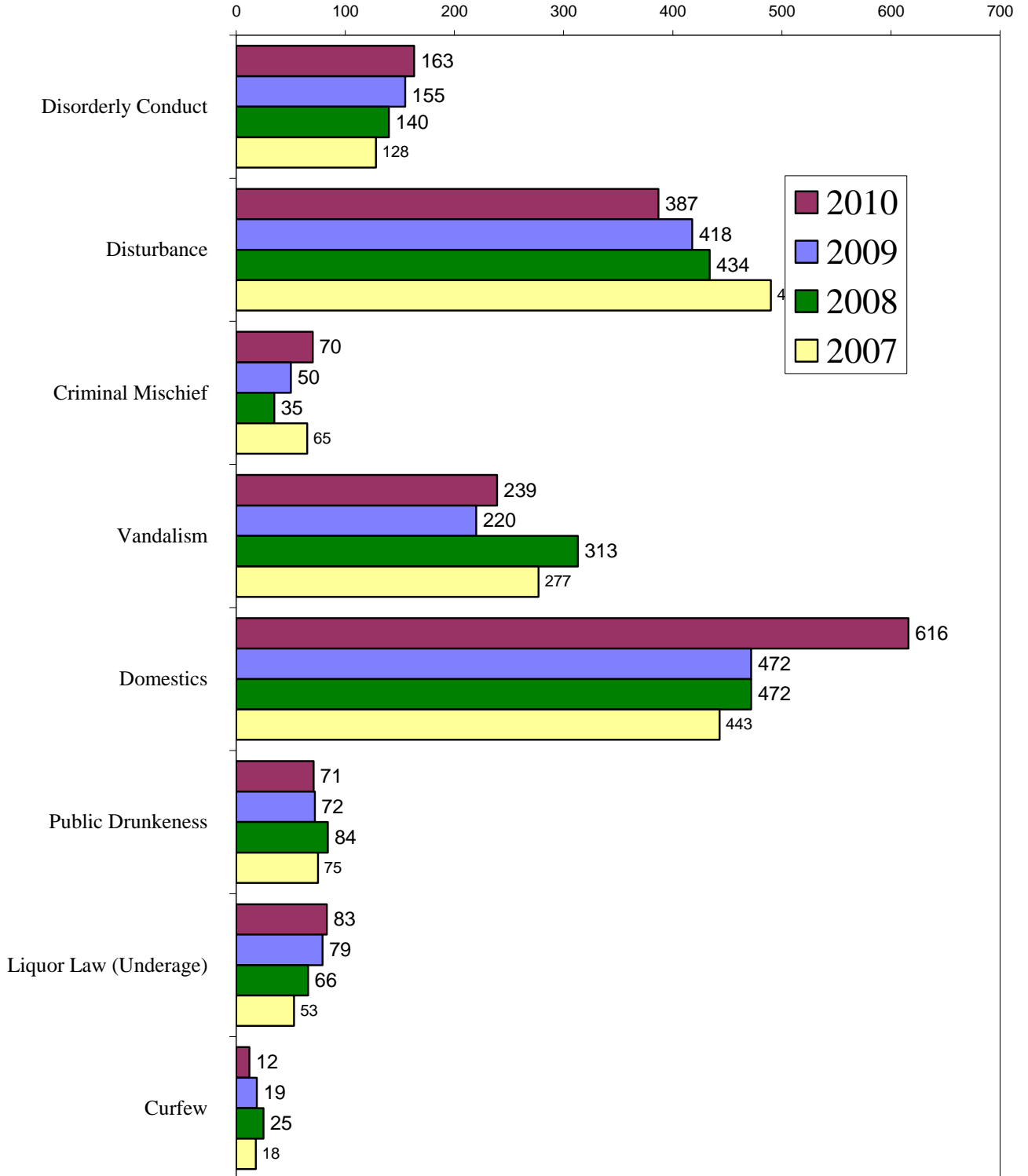

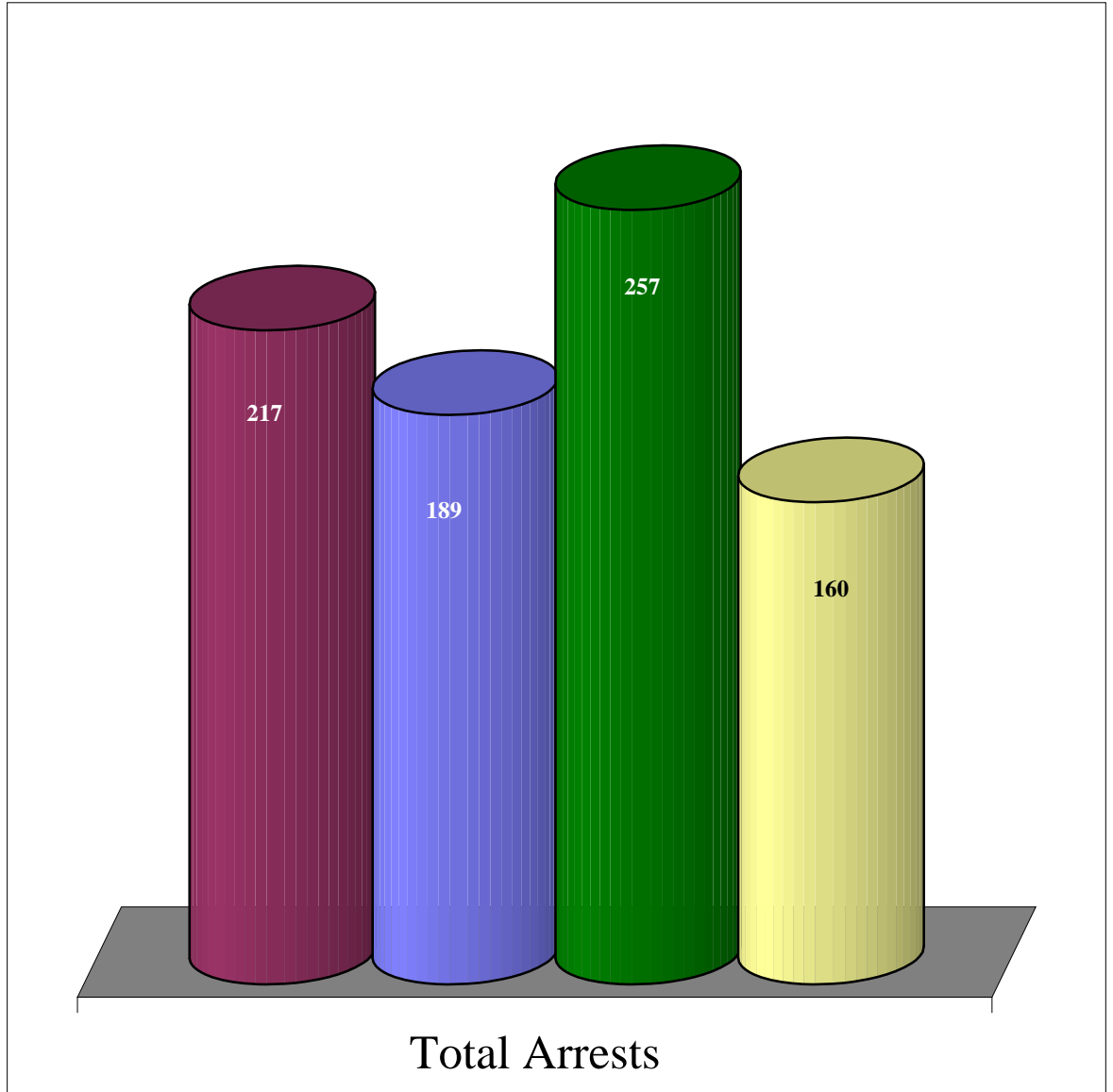
Four Year Comparison

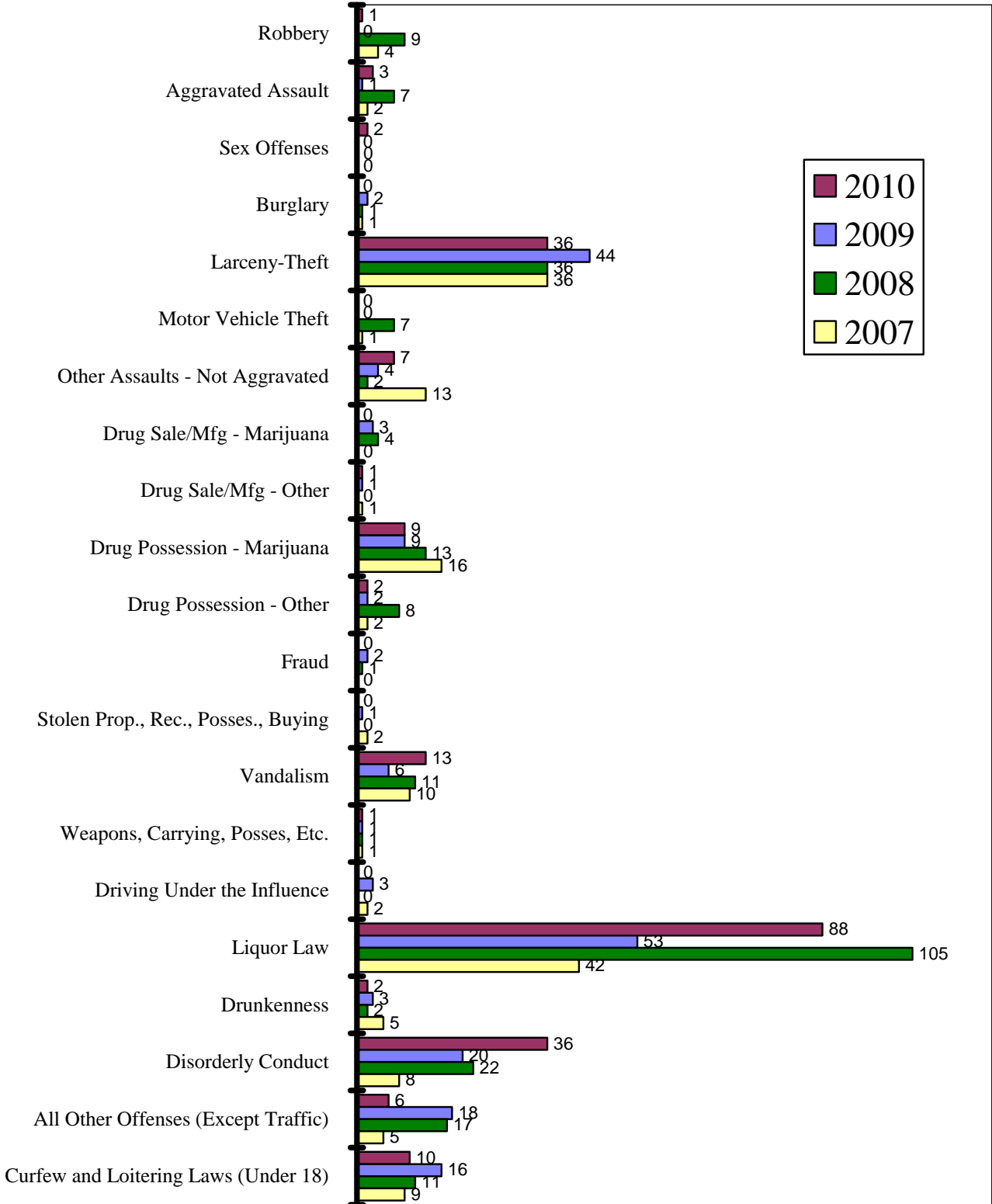
Juvenile Arrest Totals Four Year Comparison

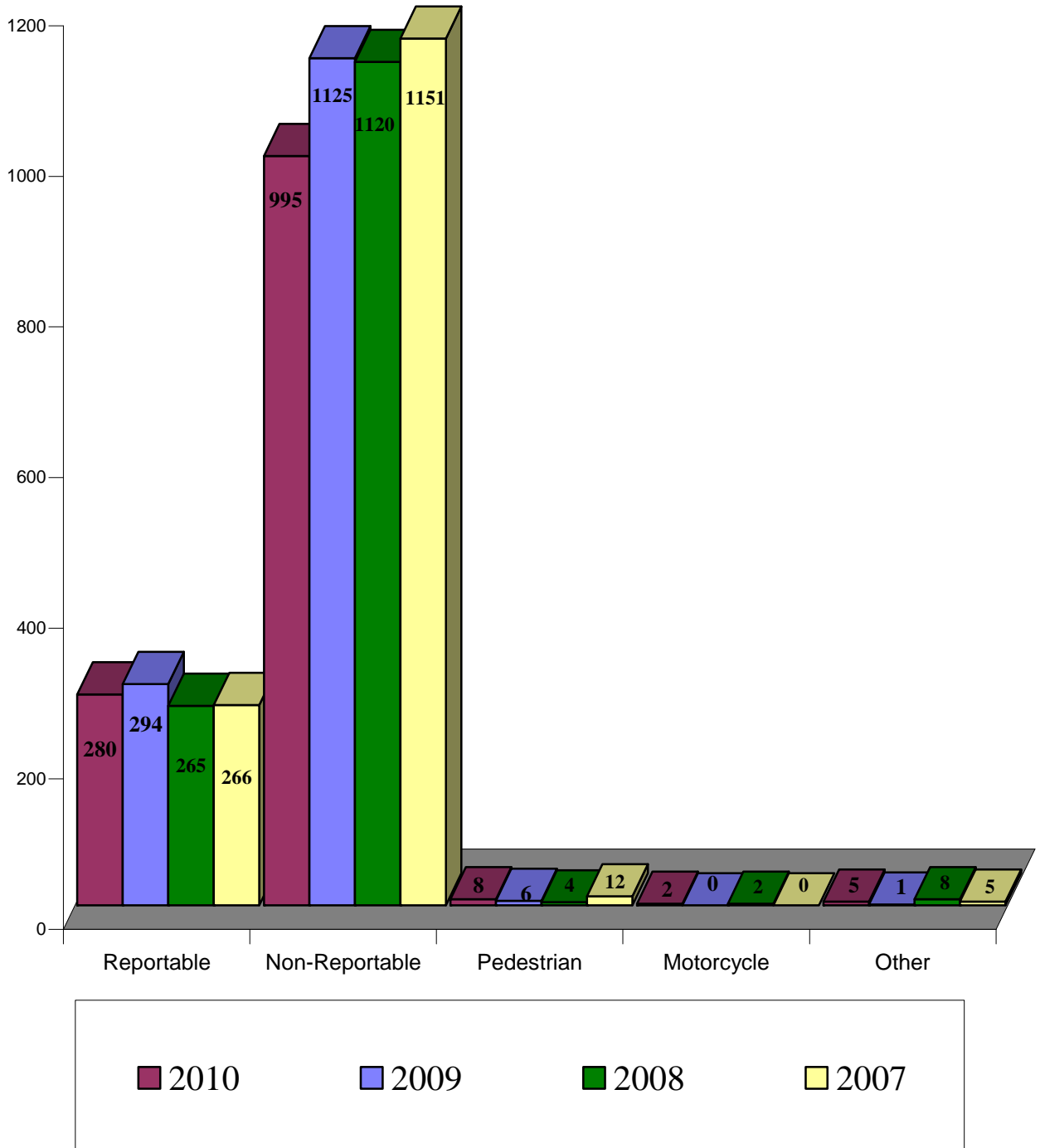
